

**Remembering Our Ancestors** Paula Noël Hibbard, 2001 The purpose of this dissertation is to provide for my community and for those brought up in a western context an account of a catalytic process for personal cultural and global transformation My intentions are 1 to define and express decolonization through narrative 2 to document my personal experience of decolonization and the Recovery of Indigenous Mind process and 3 to narrate how Recovery of Indigenous Mind is decolonization and how this reveals the connection to Ancestors a process important and necessary for healing and change Section One writes the Research Design as the content of the dissertation and why it is a process that reveals personal and cultural power at the same time deepening and grounding decolonization.
